



# Bushfire At-Risk Register - Schools



School procedures for the bushfire season

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools and children's services listed on the DET Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined in their Bureau of Meteorology district. Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire risk and is listed on the BARR.

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by letter and SMS message/phone tree.

A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day.

School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days children should never be left at home or in the care of older children.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the CFA advise that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day.

As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan, reprioritised any maintenance works that may assist in preparing for the threat of fire and cleared our facility's grounds and gutters.

#### What can parents do?

- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.
- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters and by talking to members of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.

Most importantly at this time of year, if you're planning a holiday or short stay in the bush or in a coastal area, you should check warnings in advance of travel and remain vigilant during your stay.

If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.

## Extreme plus FDR- Fire Danger Rating

These procedures clearly outline what government schools listed on the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) need to do when an elevated Fire Danger Rating (FDR) day is forecast.

Victoria's Fire Danger Rating has six categories - Code Red, Extreme, Severe, Very High, High and Low to Moderate.

There are **different procedures** for schools on the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR schools) to follow for a Code Red and for a forecast elevated Fire Danger Rating (FDR) day.

One key difference between a Code Red FDR and an elevated FDR is that Victoria's Emergency Management Commissioner determines a Code Red FDR, which triggers the process for schools on the BARR in the area rated Code Red to close.

If your school is on the BARR, it is vital you familiarise your school community with the Department of Education and Training's (DET) Code Red Day Pre-emptive Closures Policy and Procedures, on DET's website.

These procedures, however, are dedicated to what BARR schools need to do on a forecast **elevated Fire Danger Rating** (FDR) day.

These procedures clearly outline what the three categories of BARR schools need to do on a forecast elevated FDR in their area, as well as the roles and responsibilities of central Emergency Management Division (EMD) and DET regions in this process.

To keep our children and staff as safe as possible it is essential everyone understands the different safety procedures for each situation

If your school is on the BARR it is vital you familiarise your school community with these procedures.

Bushfire safety is a shared responsibility between the fires services, emergency management agencies, state and local government, communities, households and individuals.

DET's procedures for pre-emptive school relocation or closure on forecast elevated FDR days for BARR schools and the procedures for Code Red days have been developed after extensive advice and consultation with experts from the Emergency Management sector and in collaboration with school communities.

#### Forecast elevated Fire Danger Rating (FDR) days

A Fire Danger Rating (FDR) tells you how dangerous a fire would be if one started.

These ratings are forecast using Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) data for up to four days in advance, based on weather and other environmental conditions such as fuel load.

DET is working with the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO), Emergency Management Victoria (EMV), Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) and the Country Fire Authority (CFA) to develop a localised fire danger product for highest risk bushfire schools. This file will be published against the rolling four-day forecast during the summer season. The file will be uploaded to the Emergency Management – Common Operating Platform (EM-COP) daily and will be accessible to regions and schools (should they wish to register for access).

Using localised fire danger rating information to inform pre-emptive relocation or closure has strong support from Emergency Management Victoria and school communities.

#### Bushfire risk and school categorisatoin

The CSIRO has been engaged to design a bushfire risk assessment methodology and system that is categorising schools and co-located early childhood services - Outside School Hours Care (OSHC) according to risk. The result is a triaged BARR that will increasingly become a more effective tool to:

determine actions for individual facilities on days of heightened fire danger; and prioritise investment to reduce bushfire risk.

Entry criteria for the 2017-18 Bushfire at Risk Register considers:

Bushfire Prone Area designations Bushfire Management Overlay Victorian Fire Risk Register Terrain Fuel type exposure

Further, the BARR comprises three categories with all schools and early childhood services assigned to one of these categories.

Relocate/closure under localised severe fire danger conditions and above. Relocate/closure under localised extreme fire danger conditions and above Remain in situ and monitor conditions.

All BARR schools will close on a Code Red Day. Schools identified for alternate arrangements on Severe or Extreme Days must prioritise relocation in preference to closure wherever practicable.

Relocation refers to the pre-emptive decision to relocate the students and staff from their school location to a host school in response to an elevated FDR forecast.

This differs to an evacuation, which occurs in response to an imminent threat, such as a fire in the landscape.

The Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) provides a weather forecast 4pm or later, up to four days in advance.

## parenting \*ideas

**Personality strengths**—our character—play a big role in helping us build our talents. Think about anyone who has built a talent and imagine if it could have been done without character. Imagine Einstein without curiosity, The Beatles without creativity, Mother Teresa without compassion and Neil Armstrong without bravery.

Yet for decades, scientists were blind to character strength. We focused on talent, often on physical strength and skills. In fact, when I first ask young children what they think a strength is, they almost always point to their biceps or talk about being able to lift something heavy.

Once you get familiar with the language of strengths and a framework for seeing them, you'll see character strengths easily in your child. In fact, you may find your child calls on their character strengths more often than on talent to meet life's challenges.

**Three key elements of a strength-** You've probably seen a child joylessly perform at a piano recital. She may hit all the right keys, but there's no energy or enthusiasm. It's as if she doesn't want to be there. On the flip side, we've seen the child onstage who's clearly motivated and energised and who fearlessly flails through every mistake—of which there are many.

Personality strengths—our character—play a big role in helping us build our talents. Think about anyone who has built a talent and imagine if it could have been done without character.

It turns out that three elements come together to form a strength. For purposes of strength-based parenting, we need to keep our eye on all three:

**Performance (being good at something)** Watch for when your child shows above-age levels of achievement, rapid learning, and a repeated pattern of success.

**Energy (feeling good doing it)** Strengths are self-reinforcing. The more we use them, the more we get from them. They fill us with vigor. You'll notice your child has abundant energy when using a strength.

**High use (choosing to do it)** Finally, look for: what your child chooses to do in his spare time, how often they engage in a particular activity, and how they speak about that activity.

For true strengths, these three elements form a beautiful feedback loop. Great performance provides the child with a shot of high energy, so the child naturally chooses to do more. In turn, high use—also known as effort or practice—improves performance levels. So, for example, if you notice that your child is energised when they play the piano, and you provide enjoyable opportunities for them to play, if they are mining a true strength they will likely practice more, which improves their performance, which then energizes them... and so the loop continues.

Keeping this triad in mind will help you avoid pushing your child into an area that seems like a strength just because your child is good at it. It will also help you differentiate between whether your child is bingeing on an activity in an escapist way or expressing a true strength. For example, parents have asked me, "My kid is great at computer games and wants to play all the time. Is that a sign of a strength?" I reply, "Observe their energy levels at the end. Are they drained and cranky? Or energised and full of life? Are you seeing the full triad?" Computer games can tap into a child's strategic and problem-solving skills or stimulate creativity (in some games, you invent whole new worlds). Or they might just be about filling time. So look for all three signs. When you see your child do something well, with energy, and do that activity repeatedly—you'll know you've unearthed a strength.
